710. 242. 960.

What's so special about the numbers above?

710 is the number of visitors we had in 2013. No, that wasn't a typo. We, TPMC, had a total of 710 visitors joining us for all our services last year; the Filipino Ministry had 95, Youth Fusion had 60, and the Main Services had 555. Those are not small numbers.

In fact, '710' is based on the number of Welcome Packs that were given out, and we all know that not everyone who visits a church will walk up to the Welcome Booth to collect a Welcome Pack. Furthermore, couples or families who visit usually share a Welcome Pack. Based on those factors, there would, in all probability, have been a greater number of people who visited us. That's not too bad for a simple, unsophisticated, sans-glitz church situated in the heart of a residential town.

"What about this year?", you may ask. The answer to that is found in the second number. 242 is the number of visitors we, TPMC, have received as of 25th of May. Again, that's not too shabby a number. It breaks down to an average of 47 visitors a month.

Now, it is really easy to look at these figures and think: "What did we, TPMC, do so well to attract so many visitors last year? We've got to do more of whatever it is that we were doing!"

That trajectory in thought wouldn't be wrong, and there is certainly value and merit in that kind of thinking. But I would like to approach this set of figures from another perspective and therefore ask different questions: "What are we as TPMC doing to welcome all these visitors? What can we do better in our reception of these hundreds of people?"

The reason I find myself approaching the figures from this perspective is because I believe, that for every reason there may be for this encouraging number of visitors, we need to realise that ultimately, the reason is that God, being His usual gracious self, is leading and guiding all these visitors to us. And that is why we have had close to a 1,000 visitors since January last year. That's grace right there! TPMC is experiencing God's amazing grace in terms of the

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visitors He's bringing to us!

From this influx of visitors, it is evident that God wants to do something momentous in TPMC. Our part is to offer an appropriate response to what He is doing and wants to do. Which then begs the question, what are we doing about it? How should we respond to what God is doing?

It's simple: we prepare ourselves to step out of our comfort zones to welcome visitors. We show hospitality by going the extra mile to make people feel 'at home' at TPMC. In fact, that is what the Bible teaches and it isn't stingy in its mention about being hospitable. Here are just three portions where it speaks about welcome and hospitality.

"For an Overseer...must be blameless...not greedy for money, but *hospitable*..." - Titus 1:7 - 8

"Don't neglect to show hospitality..." - Hebrews 13:2

"Be *hospitable* to one another without complaining." - 1 Peter 4:9

Good and genuine hospitality would be the basic expectation of any visitor who walks into our church. As Christians (or people who follow and represent Christ here on earth), it is our calling to extend welcome all who walk through the doors of our church. The world is a cold and cruel place for those who live without Christ in their lives and people are looking for a place of refuge where they can be welcomed and accepted. As followers of Christ, let us be the extension of His love to these people.

So what do we do when we spot a visitor in church? Here are two easy steps to follow when this happens. The first step is this. (And this is really important!) Do not wait, hope, pray and expect someone else to welcome and be hospitable to the visitor. By virtue of you spotting the visitor, it is most probably you whom God wants to use to be the answer to the visitor's hope, prayer, and expectation that someone would welcome and be hospitable to him/her in this church.

The second step? *Please do* walk up, smile, introduce yourself and enquire if he/she is new. Then simply lead the person to the Welcome Booth or an usher. The leaders manning the Welcome Booth and the ushers will take care of everything else thereafter.

That's all. Two simple steps are all it takes to be welcoming and hospitable as a church. That's what we want to do and that's what we ought to do as an appropriate response to what God is doing in leading all these visitors to us.

And no, I did not forget about the 960. That's the number of members TPMC has as of Easter 2014. Surely with 960 of us, we can make the 710 and the 242 visitors feel welcomed. Surely, we can be hospitable. It's time that we, TPMC, step up and embrace a culture of welcome.



t is the Church's desire to reach the lost. How would we respond if the broken came through our doors just the way they are – a homeless beggar coated with dirt, a prostitute who is scantily clad, a gangster covered in tattoos or a person infected with HIV, stricken with sores? Most of us would judge them at first glance, some might even be offended, but how many would respond as Jesus did?

As Jesus ministered to people, there was an instance where a leper fell before Him and cried out. Considering the symptoms of leprosy, and with the understanding people had about it in those days, everyone avoided lepers at all cost. Except Jesus.

"Little children, let us not love in word or talk but in deed and in truth." - 1 John 3: 18

Jesus could have healed the leper with a spoken word, but He chose to touch him. He recognized that the leper needed more than physical healing – he also needed acceptance. Jesus met that need when He

demonstrated love not just with words, but with action.

Scripture points out that when we decide to love someone, there must be a visible evidence of that love. It is not about making that decision inwardly and then doing nothing about it outwardly.

CHILDREN IN CHURCH

t seemed to be a great church. It had a huge building with professional security guards who stood watch at the entrance. There were comfortable seats in the sanctuary, a passionate worship ministry and the speaker preached a dynamic message. However, I never went back to the church after that.

The reason? My girl who was three years old then was not welcomed in the church service. The church had a policy that parents with children were not allowed to sit in the main auditorium but were asked to sit in the gallery. Still, when I was sitting in the gallery with my girl, we received a few 'dagger' stares from the usher when my girl was not able to keep quiet during the service.

The whole experience set me thinking, 'Where is the place for children in church? Should our children be relegated to worshipping in a separate children's church setting so that adults can have a peaceful time of worship without being disturbed?'

Let's see what the Bible says about children participating with adults in worship. In Old Testament times, the children of Israel were not only instructed to participate in different festivals, but were also encouraged to attend and hear the words of the law.

'You shall rejoice in your feast, you and your son and your daughter, your male servant....'

- Deuteronomy 16: 13

'Assemble the people, men, women and little ones, that they may hear and learn to fear the Lord your God, and be careful to do all the words of this law and that their children who have not known it, may hear and learn to fear the Lord your God...' - Deuteronomy 31: 12 – 13

In Paul's letter written to the churches at Ephesus and Colossae, Paul specifically addressed the children:

'Children, obey your parents in the Lord for this is right.' - Ephesians 6: 1

'Children, obey your parents in everything...'
- Colossians 3: 20a



Paul's letters were to be read to the Christian gatherings in these cities and it is reasonable to conclude that children were part of the Christian gatherings and they were present to hear the instructions from Paul.

I would like to believe that the children during Moses' and Paul's time were not too different from our children today. Babies pooed and wailed, young toddlers crawled as they explored different parts of the room and restless children moved about in their seats.

If the early church could make room for children in their worship gatherings, couldn't we too? Of course, parents definitely need to play the important role of disciplining children when they get too rowdy. And they should also encourage the children to participate in the service.

As members of TPMC, if we say that our church is indeed 'No place like *His* home', can't we make room for children in our services too? Besides the importance of families worshipping together, children learn through role-modelling – when they see adults worshipping, they are encouraged to worship too.

In the gospels, when some parents brought their children to Jesus, the disciples tried to push them away. Maybe in their minds, children were considered too unimportant for Jesus to pay attention to. However, Jesus said, "Let the little children come to me and do not hinder them, for to such belongs the kingdom of heaven." And he laid His hands on them. Jesus welcomed children and did not find them a nuisance. Jesus' loving and embracing attitude towards children should encourage us to embrace children in our church too.



IT'S OUR RESPONSIBILITY





A LOOK BACK: LGBT



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A CHURCH WITH OPEN DOORS, OPENS HEARTS

"Let's just go for fun! We'll see how much we can push their buttons," Amy teased her girlfriend, who didn't like the idea of hanging around a bunch of Christians.

"Come on," Amy insisted. "I hear their motto is 'Come as you are.' I just want to prove that they're 'come as you are ... unless you're gay.'"

"I came on a mission to shock people," Amy admits. "Rachel and I would hold hands in front of people, but instead of the disgusted looks of contempt we expected, people met eyes with us and treated us like real people. So we started coming to church weekly. We kept moving closer to the front each week, trying to get a reaction so that we'd be rejected sooner rather than later. When we couldn't shock people, we stopped trying and started learning."

"Not long after that, Rachel and I stopped seeing each other, but I kept coming to church because I was searching for something," Amy admits. "I definitely wasn't looking to change. It wasn't my lesbian lifestyle that I was bringing to God, but I wondered if God had answers to my deeper longings. Problem was, I didn't trust God at all!

"The more I listened and learned about the teachings of Jesus, the more I started to actually believe that God really did love me. I heard more and more about being His masterpiece, and in time, I actually started to believe it. The more I believed God actually could see something of value in me, the more I trusted Him." Over time, Amy slowly opened her heart and struggles to Christ.

"It took several years, but as I moved closer and closer to Christ, He gently took me on a very surprising journey," she says. "First, I found out my father had nine affairs while I was growing up—a secret that rocked my world. Jesus began to show me how the roots of my sexual issues tie together with my dad's—I was just like him, using people to find comfort, life and love outside of God."

Amy continued to grow in her knowledge of the Scriptures, falling more and more in love with the Lord. The following year, God had another surprise for her: "I went to the seminar called 'To Be Told,' hosted at Gateway. I wanted to see how God could put closure to my brokenness, but what He showed me shocked me."

"As Dan Allender was telling a story of a bully," Amy recalls, "I suddenly had a flashback of getting off the school bus. I lived down the street from Jimmy, a boy who had bullied me all year. But this particular day, Jimmy acted nice to me as I got off the bus. He apologised for being so mean, and he invited me to come to his house."

That day in the seminar, all else faded to black as this vivid nightmare crept back to life. Amy saw herself walking through Jimmy's front door, noticing all the shades pulled down. Startled, she spied two teenage boys eyeing her with a ravenous look as the door slammed shut. Her screams never escaped the evil darkness that enveloped that house. They pinned her down and raped her. She was only 9!


Amy swam in a pool of tears as the seminar continued. Others were oblivious to her divine epiphany. She realized the Lord had been drawing her near to strengthen her for this revelation—to show her the source of so much sexual struggle hidden for years beneath layers of protective mud.

"After that, I realized God knows more about me than I know about myself," Amy recalls, "and He wants to bring healing to these wounds, so I fully gave Him my heart and body—everything. As I continued to seek intimacy with Him, the lesbian struggles fell away. I'm not saying that's how God works with everyone, but it's how He's healing me. The more I focus on God's intimate love for me and try to see His masterpiece emerge, the less I want anything to get in the way of His work in me."

Seven years later, Amy leads our ministry to help people find healing and wholeness from all kinds of sexual and relational struggles. She's helping others become God's restored masterpiece. ■

Both of us experienced numerous conflicts arising from staying together as a couple and raising children. On many occasions, the conflicts remained unresolved and bottled up within us. One of the exercises in the classes asked the couples to list and share some of the conflicts we had experienced during marriage.

The sharing helped ease some of our unsettled emotions and I learned that it was wiser to forget, especially since the other party might be unaware and not even remember the conflict!" -Billie Ooi

"Make no mistake, marriage is tough. Entering a marital relationship is the easy part, but staying connected and committed requires a whole lot of effort, wisdom, and trust. Marriage, it turns out, is a marathon, not a sprint.

When we joined the Marriage Course last year, Hwee Leng and I were celebrating our tenth wedding

anniversary that year. One might think that ten years is plenty of time to develop an understanding of each other, but the Marriage Course showed that there would always be new areas to work on, new skills to acquire, new depths of appreciation.

The Marriage Course allowed Hwee Leng and me to spend time with each other without the children around. It allowed us to talk about issues important to us, and made us a stronger team." -Gabriel Ong

On the topic covering art of communication, we were able to identify our own shortcomings and were prepared to change. We have improved and are now better able to talk about our feelings with each other. Previously, miscommunication led to many conflicts in our marriage." -Jimmy Ong
