THE DIVINE EXCHANGE

here are many key dates and occasions in the Christian calendar, but none of them are as sombre, or weigh as heavily on the heart and soul, as that of Good Friday. (Only recently did I come to understand why it was even called "Good", thanks to a recent sermon from Rev Reuben Ng). Not surprisingly, upon reading the order of worship, it stated that the Good Friday service was the service of Tenebrae, meaning "darkness" or "shadow".

Sin is present in everyone's life. Sin comes in to kill and destroy. As Rev Reuben said "Either the lamb dies or you die!" At the cross, many year ago, Jesus Christ hung as sacrificial lamb - perfect, wire or blemish, for you and me Friday, divine exchange

The meaningful service walked me spiritually through the last few hours in the life of our Lord Jesus Christ. I am reminded that despite being God, He was also human, and because He was human, He had feelings just like you and me. He loved, He felt betrayal, loneliness, injustice, temptation, pain, and finally, death. The passages read during the service resonated powerfully with me. Just two years ago, I had visited those very places: Via Dolorosa, the Garden of Gethsemane, Golgotha, and the Garden Tomb. These helped paint a vivid picture of the biblical scenes being described.

From deep within me, questions were brought to the surface: Can it be that my God would love me so much (even me, after all that I've done), to be willing to endure all this pain, betrayal, shame? Why? Why would He do it?

The answer is Love. It is a love that does not let us go. Despite knowing that going to Jerusalem meant that He would die, He went. Despite knowing that Judas would betray him, Jesus loved him and washed his feet. Despite having heard the crowds shouting to crucify Him, He prayed for their forgiveness while He bled on the cross. Amazing Love! I couldn't help but silently cry in my heart, in shame for my own wretchedness, and in thankfulness that my God would love me so much.

Sin is present in everyone's life. Sin comes in to kill and destroy. As Rev Reuben said, "Either the lamb dies or you die!" At the cross, many years ago, Jesus Christ hung as the sacrificial lamb - perfect, without sin or blemish, for you and me. On that very first Good Friday, divine exchange happened. My life was redeemed at the cost of God's Son. On that cross, He bore my pain and my shame. In return, death passes over me as I wear the robes of His righteousness. It was apt that the choir sang the hymn "His Robes for mine":

His robes for mine: O wonderful exchange! Clothed in my sin, Christ suffered 'neath God's rage Draped in His righteousness, I'm justifiedIn Christ I live, for in my place He died

I cling to Christ, and marvel at the cost:
Jesus forsaken, God estranged from God.
Bought by such love,
my life is not my own,
My praise - my all - shall be for Christ alone

How would this encounter change me? Unlike Christmas, where there is much merrymaking, Good Friday is a heavy and sombre occasion. However, on this Good Friday of 2017, I did not leave the service depressed and gloomy. Instead, there was a quiet sense of assurance, peace, and hope: assurance in God's love, coming to peace with my past and my sins, and hope because He now lives in me. No matter what life circumstances I may face in my future, in poverty or in plenty, in illness or in health, in loneliness or in good company, He will be with me. I can now face tomorrow with courage and strength. It was beautiful that the string ensemble closed the service with "The Holy City"...indeed, "Hosanna in the highest, hosanna to your King!"

GOOD FRIDAY

THE END IS NIGH

Say the words "Easter Sunday", and hardly anyone will associate this with modernity. However, the playwright, Juan Toong, managed to take a fresh twist on the ever-familiar story of **Jesus dying** on the Cross and subsequently rising from the grave. Starring a cast of local inhouse (or in-church) talent, this musical attempts to recast the conquering of the grave from a different perspective. For the everyday folk witnessing such a situation, what are their feelings and thoughts as they struggle whether or not to believe in this seemingly ludicrous truth?

We start with the protagonist, Sam Seng (William Ho), a private investigator lounging in his office. Suddenly a mysterious lady, Annie Ting (Amanda Aw Yong) appears and offers Sam Seng an attractive proposal: if he disproves the rumour circulating about the townsfolk that Jesus has risen from the dead, he will receive a handsome sum of money. Sam agrees, and sets off on his journey to find out more about this "Jesus" from various characters – Mary Magdalene (Shikaye Yap), a singer belting out songs, and two men from Emmaus (Ravi Cuttilan and Maria Selvam), rappers throwing out words in rhythmic succession. The more Sam discovers along his journey, the more he starts to contemplate: is this Jesus person real?





Just as Sam finds the evidence to prove that Jesus was real, Annie Ting makes her re-entrance. Sam reports his findings, every single word dancing with his excitement. However, Annie remains unimpressed and drops the bomb on Sam: it doesn't matter whether it's real or not. Accenting every word harshly, she demands Sam destroy the evidence and take it that Jesus never existed. Flabbergasted, Sam wonders: is this the right thing to do? The musical concludes then, in openended fashion, leaving viewers to contemplate this with Sam as well: is Jesus real?

All in all, the performance was a relatable retell of the story of Jesus' rising from the dead. Focusing on the inner struggles to believe in a God who died for our sins, and the resulting internal confusion, definitely reflects on what many pre-believers and even believers grapple with – trust. This ends off the story on a contemplative note for every one of us: what would we do if Jesus were to die and rise from the grave in this day and age?















MANADO TRIP

Recently, Rev Reuben Ng (TPMC Pastor-in-charge) shared the passage from Acts 1:8. What he said really struck me: we are not called to be witnesses in Jerusalem and THEN in Judea and Samaria: we are to be witnesses to Judea, AND Samaria, AND to the end of the earth. There is no 'and then'. It is now.

I went on my first mission trip to Manado on 11-15 March, together with Rev Reuben, Daniel Lee, Clement Sim, Don Chee and Roslyn Sim. There was a day conference on church growth strategies where Rev Reuben, Daniel and Roslyn shared their experiences with pastors and leaders from the local churches. Over the five days, we visited ten churches and ministries to share the Word of God and our testimonies.



Prior to this trip, I was challenged to share a message with one of the ministries. For some reason, I agreed to it. The panic kicked in later because I am not comfortable with public speaking and have not shared my testimony before. I wanted to make sure my sermon would not have any mistakes. In preparation for it, I shared my script with the team and was tweaking it all the way till that evening itself. No surprise, I was extremely tense and caught myself wishing for the session to be cancelled. I was reminded that this was not about me, but about God. Then, it was my turn. I went up on stage. As I spoke, the anxiety did not go away, and I kept perspiring. I glued my eyes to the screen and nervously shared my message. I also didn't know how to link my sermon to ministry time. Thankfully, Daniel came up and saved me.

The local pastor shared that he wants to challenge the youths to preach because I stepped up and preached. That was when I truly understood how God intended to use me during this mission trip. God did not expect me to deliver the best sermon, the way I wanted to. All He wanted for me was to just be there and to share.

I was blessed by the trip - listening to the messages and testimonies and seeing how God can use us. Mostly importantly, my greatest takeaway is that when you avail yourself, God will do the rest.


