


The marks of a church ready for Christ's return include:

Tell us more about yourself.


I am Richard. My wife is Nancy and we have a son and a daughter. We are also the proud and loving grandparents to our granddaughter.



CHAI 3:16

From 1 to 4 July 2019, a team from TPMC visited the Chai Café in Bangalore, India. Better known as Chai 3:16, the café is a vision of Dr Benny Prasad who started the mission to reach out to college students in India. India is widely known to have a high student suicide rate, and Bangalore is often identified as the country's suicide capital! Dr Prasad shared this message when he visited TPMC in 2015 and 2018, and I was intrigued to visit the cafe to find out more.



Chai, a common word for tea in India, is also the Hebrew word for "Life". So Chai 3:16 effectively refers to John 3:16 and not tea, even though most visitors think that it is a tea café, which makes it a good attraction. Anyone can visit the café and enjoy several varieties of tea for free. They are served in special teacups which are not available elsewhere and not for sale. The cafe staff are always there to engage visitors and build relationships. This relationship building allows Christ's message of hope, love and grace to be brought into discussion.











The visitors are mainly students from a nearby college. Many are frequent visitors who come to enjoy a cup of tea and converse with the staff (and volunteers like us). When we were there, new students were dropping by every day. Quite a number were non-believers who still enjoyed visiting the centre while knowing that it is Christian-based. When we asked them why they keep coming back, they said the centre is a quiet and calming place (perhaps away from the frenzied activities in the college). These students are well-educated and appear well and normal on the outside. However, as the staff got to know them better, the students shared their fears and anxieties. The staff shared with us that some had even entertained suicidal thoughts. One had planned to throw himself in front of a train. He said that God directed him to go to Chai 3:16, and the staff managed to talk him out of his intent.





Chai 3:16 uses a very different outreach model from what we are accustomed to. The cafe is almost like a spiritual discipline retreat with specific schedules and duties that need to be followed. At the same time, it is an outreach in which volunteers have a chance to work alongside local cafe staff when they interact with visitors. Instead of going out to organise games and community outreach activities, Chai 3:16 invites the community to engage them at the cafe. There is little activity but a lot of listening and talking. It was a worthwhile time for TPMC members to be involved with the work at Chai 3:16. It is meaningful to know that you can impact lives by listening and talking, even if it is only for a few days.

CELEBRATION OF HOPE

Coming together as one people in unity to celebrate this one true Hope of the world was what the English-Filipino rally of the COH was all about.

"Joy of Hope" was the theme of the English-Filipino rally that was held on the morning of 19 May 2019. The theme was aimed at bringing the joy of the Lord to all who attended the rally. Artists from the Philippines and talents from Filipino churches and performance groups in Singapore made the event extraordinarily distinct from other rallies. While the event was for everyone, the focus was to bless Filipinos and other migrants in the land.

Members from our Filipino Ministry were among the estimated 12,000 who attended this phenomenal event. We were amazed and blessed with wonderful performances, touching testimonies, and preaching of the Word of God. Finally, when the preacher invited attendees to come down from the stands to be prayed for, a total of 1,309 people responded. They streamed down excited and joyful to receive the promised hope of God.

This amazing rally was made possible by the efforts of the Network of Filipino Churches (NetFil) in Singapore, support from St. Andrew's Cathedral, and God's grace.





ENGLISH RALLY

"Held over 3 days from 17 to 19 May 2019...with more than 100,000 attendees...streamed live and watched from places as distant as Mongolia..." The COH 2019 is about Christians in Singapore rallying together and reaching out to share Jesus Christ with relatives, friends and colleagues.

I attended the final English session titled "The Reality of Hope" on 19 May 2019 at 7.30pm. Although I was initially taken aback by the long snaking queues and large crowds, it was an amazing event that moved me deeply. There were powerful testimonies, worship songs and preaching. Canon John Ioannou, an international evangelist better known as J. John, was the last speaker for the event. He said:

"You do not prove God. You experience God. Look up to God. Look in (and examine ourselves). Look back. Look around. Look forward. And ask God to fix me. Fix my breakages."

Living in a broken world, I could not agree more.





Can you give an example?

EVECUNTER LOVE EVANGELISE EDIFY EXTEND ENERGISE

EVANGELISE

This Huddle involves ministries related to Sunday services such as Worship & Music, Audio-visual Technical, Hospitality as well as the Creative Arts and Dance teams. The EVANGELISE Huddle seeks to create opportunities for an encounter with God and to remind us that Sunday services are not about us, but to proclaim Jesus Christ for all to encounter Him.

EDIFY

This Huddle includes ministries such as Connect Groups, Discipleship & Nurture, Prayer & Healing as well as the Seniors and Young Adults Groups. The EDIFY Huddle seeks to build TPMC in love, through the care and nurture of our people so that they may grow to be like Christ.

EXTEND

This Huddle comprises ministries such as Missions, Outreach & Social Concerns, Witness & Evangelism, Children's Ministry and the Boys' & Girls' Brigades. The EXTEND Huddle seeks to extend God's kingdom by spreading God's love to our communities and other nations.

ENERGISE

This Huddle involves ministries related to administration, communication and logistics, such as Communications & Media, Property Management, Finance and Governance. The ENERGISE Huddle seeks to energise the other three Huddles to enable them to function effectively.

MINISTRY FAIR

In line with the sermon series on Stewardship, TPMC held a ministry recruitment fair over two Sundays on 21 and 28 July 2019. The fair showcased the different ministries under the four Huddles, where worshippers can volunteer, and steward the gifts and abilities that God had blessed us with.

ENCOUNTERING DEATH: SOME PRACTICAL ADVICE

With faith in Jesus Christ, we know that Christ has defeated death and we no longer have to fear it. We can face death with peace and hope because in Christ, we have God's promise of resurrection and eternal life. Still, when encountering death, whether that of our own or a loved one, it is natural to be filled with sadness, knowing that we will no longer have his or her physical company. This sadness is not to be discouraged as it stems from a genuine love for one another. After the death of a loved one, it is also natural for a period of mourning and grief. Nevertheless, Jesus continues to be with us and provides us with hope, and the church rallies around as a family in Christ to comfort and help us in our time of need.

At the same time, the death of a loved one can often give rise to confusion and anxiety over practical matters for those who remain, especially family members. Below is some practical advice on how we may help our loved ones and one another in such times of grief.

LEAVING WITH CARE FOR LOVED ONES

It is good to get one's concerns in order instead of waiting till one is terminally ill and unable to make decisions. Consider doing the following:

a

Establish a Lasting Power of Attorney (LPA) to designate a trusted and competent person to attend to one's financial and legal matters

To facilitate the person entrusted with the LPA, financial documents (e.g. bank passbooks and statements, insurance policies) should be properly organised and kept.

b

Draft a will

A will ensures that one's assets are properly distributed according to one's wishes when one passes on. This helps to provide for one's aged spouse, children, etc. Drafting a will also helps to communicate clearly one's plan on how one wishes to apportion the assets left behind. It also facilitates the legal process for one's desired inheritors to receive what one has intended for them.

C

Plan for one's wake or funeral service

Pastors of the church are always available to plan with and guide the family members through these services. However, there may be some finer details which are particular to one or his/her family and some families have found it helpful when the loved one has indicated as such.

Some things to consider include the duration of the wake, photograph to be used, and clothes to be worn. Favourite biblical verses and hymns/songs can also be communicated so that they can be displayed and played at the wake. It is also helpful to make known one's preference between burial or cremation, and the resting place of one's remains.

Setting out these arrangements helps one's loved ones to be of a single mind regarding them. If one does not have a preference, a clear designation of the person who would be entrusted with the decisions or a simple instruction like "Let the pastor decide on the service" will go a long way in helping loved ones know that they are complying with one's last wishes.

WHEN DEATH OCCURS 1

There are four main things to do when a loved one passes on. Doing the following in the given sequence helps to facilitate the funeral arrangements. Nevertheless, you may also simply contact the church office (Tel: 62598644 during office hours) or a pastor and they will be with you and guide you through the process.



Obtain a Certificate of Cause of Death (CCOD) 2

A CCOD is required before any funeral arrangements can be carried out.

- If the death occurs in a hospital: A doctor at the hospital will follow up to arrange for the CCOD. The family can obtain the CCOD from the ward nurse with the identity card of the deceased.
- If the death occurs at home:
 - i. Contact the family doctor who has been attending to the deceased. If one is unavailable, contact a neighbourhood doctor who is able to make a house-call. The doctor will assist in the issuance of the certificate of death.
 - ii. If a doctor cannot be found, contact the police who will provide assistance.



Inform the Church

Contact the church office or one of our pastors if their contact numbers are on hand, and inform them of the death. They will be with you and guide you in the arrangement of the wake and/or funeral services. This also enables the leaders of the church to pray for the family in its time of need.



Engage a Funeral Director

Engage a funeral director to attend to the preparation of the body for the wake and/or cremation or burial. This includes collection of the body from the home/hospital, embalming and delivery to the location of the wake. They will also assist in the logistics of setting up the venue for the wake and subsequent cremation or burial arrangements.

If the deceased had earlier indicated his/her wishes, these may be conveyed to the funeral director. If not, discuss the location and duration of the wake with the other family members of the deceased as the funeral director will require the information.

If the wake is to be located at a public void deck or community pavilion, or along a public road, the family will need to apply for the necessary permit from HDB or LTA. The funeral director will guide you in the process.

² The steps provided here assume a natural cause of death. In cases where the cause of death cannot be determined as natural, it is required by law to refer the death to the police. It may take a few more days before the body of the deceased can be released for funeral arrangements.

Place an obituary

Besides informing relatives and friends, the family of the deceased may consider placing an obituary with the local newspapers as a memorial and to notify others (e.g. friends of the deceased) who have not been contacted.

Register the death (This can be done at the same time as steps (b) or (c))

The family of the deceased has to register his/her death with the police or at the Registry of Births & Deaths in ICA. The CCOD and NRIC/Passport/Certificate of Birth of the deceased will be required for the registration.

AFTER THE FUNERAL

After the funeral, some administrative matters may need to be done.³

a

Safekeep important documents

Documents such as the death certificate, marriage certificate (as proof of marriage), birth certificate (as proof of parent-child relationship) should be safely kept as they are needed to be tendered to the court. Financial documents should be properly maintained to facilitate estate administration. With increasing use of the Internet and online services, it may be necessary to close or transfer online accounts of the deceased to prevent misuse.

b

Manage the deceased's estate

The family may consider engaging a lawyer or the Public Trustee (if the deceased's estate is less than \$50,000) to assist in the estate administration.


